Worship

On May 24, 1738, John Wesley attended a worship service or group meeting in Aldersgate Street in London. He wrote that "his heart was strangely warmed" and he experienced an assurance of his own salvation. This was a turning point for John Wesley and the Methodist movement in Britain and America. Later on the phrase "the world is my parish" became synonymous with the invitation to preach the Good News to all.

I had the privilege to visit the Wesley Chapel in London and walked in the parsonage beside the chapel. Worship life was central to John Wesley and in his room there was an adjoining room that he used as a private chapel. His brother Charles, also shaped the development of the Methodist movement by using hymns to connect us with God. Charles Wesley's organ was also in display where he composed many beautiful hymns we still sing today for worship.

What is worship? Why is it central to our faith? Worship is our approach to God and offering what is pleasing in God's sight. Through the years worship emerged as it speaks to the new generation of believers.

This sort of thing happens when God meets us in a particular place. It can be anywhere, the beauty of nature as spring flower emerges, in the busy intersection

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when we are stuck in traffic, in quiet places where we seek refuge or even in places where life and death intersects. When God meets us, God leaves an imprint in our lives.

In Genesis, Jacob called the name of the place, "Bethel" where he encountered the holy God. We call it "*Our Redeemer's*" because God calls us here to worship.

We are thus given a responsibility to share this blessing. The format for worship varies from time to time because our worship is beyond time. Worship is central to our faith because it is enduring.

In worship: we adore God, we admit our shortcomings, we aspire to be closer to God and we offer our thanksgiving.

In worship all the "elements" of creation are in play. We meet Jesus in the bread and wine. There is joy in believing in the power of Christ and that's the gift of worship. The details are in the way we live out our calling as beloved children of God. Make a connection.

Join us for worship as it prepares us for the next season of faith.

The Community Crisis Center is a non-profit social service agency providing services to individuals and families in Kane and NW Suburban Cook County, who are dealing with economic, domestic violence or sexual assault. They are in need of the following items:

Foods and Snacks: soup, ravioli, Spaghettio's, chili, sloppy joe mix, applesauce, cereal, pasta and sauces, saltine and graham crackers, microwave popcorn, granola bars, fruit and pudding cup, juice boxes, instant tea/soft drink mixes

Baby Needs: formula, baby bottles, cups with lids

Women and Children: summer pajamas, swim suits (new or gently used), sunblock lotion, mosquito repellent, box & oscillating fans, umbrellas

Day of Faith at the Capitol May 9, 2017

You are invited to join members of ORUMC for a lobby day in Springfield, which is organized annually by Community Renewal Society (CRS). The mission of CRS is to advocate for racial and economic justice for all people. All our work is done remembering that we are called by Jesus to advocate for those suffering injustice.

Each year we meet with legislators in Springfield to explain our collective concerns and to ask them to support specific bills. This year we will join a few hundred other church members as we ask legislators to support three bills. With about 42% of all Illinois adults having a criminal record, it is critical that we address barriers to jobs, housing, and education.

1. HB 2373 will expand the eligibility for the sealing of felony convictions for those who have completed their sentence, have waited 3 years, and are seriously seeking employment and/or housing.

Without a job or a place to live, the likelihood of recidivism is much greater. According to this bill, these individuals must file a petition to have their records sealed.

2. HB 3142 will "ban the box", which asks if you have a criminal record, on applications to public colleges and universities so that those with a criminal record have a

chance to continue their education. Higher education also reduces recidivism and helps individuals build financially stable futures.

3. HB 3202 and SB 1661 will improve investigations of police misconduct in our state. State law now requires anyone filing a complaint against a police officer to sign a sworn affidavit. This policy discourages individuals from coming forward with legitimate claims and keeps hidden serious misconduct that should be investigated. The bill ensures that a sworn affidavit need not be signed when filing a complaint. It is recommended by the US Dept. of Justice Civil Rights Division's Investigation of the Chicago Police Department and the city of Chicago's Police Accountability's Taskforce.

There is much more information on these bills available to you in the narthex. If you decide to take action and join us on May 9, you will receive training by team captains on the way to Springfield. Breakfast and lunch will be provided. We will meet at our church at approximately 6:00 am to drive to Arlington Heights First United Methodist Church to get on the bus. We will return around 7:30 pm. Please sign up in the narthex to experience a very interesting and rewarding day.

ORUMC Summer Missions 2017 Appalachia Service Project and Disaster Relief Efforts

This summer, the youth and adults of Our Redeemer's UMC have the privilege of serving Christ through two important mission opportunities.

First, on June 10, we are sending 15 youth and adults to the Appalachia Region as part of the Appalachia Service Project (ASP). This is a home repair ministry with the goal to make homes "warmer, safer and drier" for those in need.

Then on July 22, approximately 35 adult volunteers will help with disaster relief efforts in the St. Louis area from the terrible floods they experienced in 2015.

We need your help for both of these trips. It will cost about \$8,000 for the ASP Team and we estimate about \$8,000 for the Adult Mission Team. We are asking that you sponsor these youth and adults who have committed a week of their summer to serve Christ through serving others.
