Easter 2019



The theme for our journey towards Easter is "Worship in the Wilderness". We focused on the journey of Jesus from the waters of baptism, to the wilderness, to the cross in Calvary and the joy of the Resurrection. It was only after the Resurrection that the disciples finally embraced that Jesus is the promised Messiah. Jesus offered salvation, a new life in the Kingdom of God.

I learned that the word "disaster", that is often the cause of natural events or phenomenon originally meant "without a star." So that those in the midst of darkness, no longer looked inwardly but gazed outwardly and receive the brightness of the stars in the horizon. I was in Crested Butte, Colorado last summer and was amazed at the bright stars before me. A sight familiar with the local residents was new to me. Vincent Van Gogh who painted "The Starry Night" wrote, "I compare the

stars to dots on a map, as one takes a train to travel on Earth, we take a death to reach a star."

Jesus faced death on the cross. Imagine the centurion who was assigned to guard Jesus as he was breathing his last breath. What was this unusual silence and kindness? But most of all, there was darkness. One minute the searing sun, the next moment darkness. The journey that began in the desert is coming to an end. But it is not the end that others were so afraid to claim. The journey of Christ is now going to be revealed in a different way.

Imagine the words that Jesus spoke: *Jesus said to her, "I am the resurrection and the life. The one who believes in me will live, even though they die; and whoever lives by believing in me will never*

*die.” ( John 11:25-26) “With great power the apostles continued to testify to the resurrection of the Lord Jesus. And God’s grace was so powerful at work in them all. In his great mercy he has given us new birth into a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead.” ( I Peter 1:3) “He is not here; he has risen! ## Community Crisis Center

Dear Church Family,

The Crisis Center is always in need of so many different things. At the present time they are in need of the following items: Powdered laundry detergent (HE formula), fabric softener sheets, dishwashing liquid, dishwasher powder/liquid, bleach, cleansers, SOS pads, dishcloths, towels, sponges, aluminum foil, plastic wrap, plastic storage bags, plastic drinking cups and cereal bowls, flatware, kitchen utensils, large storage containers with lids ground coffee (regular and decaf), bath towels, washcloths (new or gently used), box and oscillating fans.

In addition, the Crisis Center is also in need of the following food items: Non-perishable canned and boxed goods, canned items with pop top lids, canned fruit, soups, Ravioli, Spaghetti, sloppy joe mix, applesauce, cereal, pasta and sauces, saltine and graham crackers, microwave popcorn, granola bars, fruit and pudding cups, juice boxes, instant tea, soft drink mixes.

Baby needs: disposable diapers (larger sizes and pull-ups), diaper wipes.

Toiletries: toothpaste, toothbrushes, bar soap, shampoo and conditioner

## **From the Bishop's Office** ***Message post-General Conference***

**“I am deeply disappointed the One Church Plan did not prevail”**

***March 1, 2019***

***Dear Friends and Members of the Northern Illinois Annual Conference:***

The long-awaited Special Session of the General Conference of the United Methodist Church in St. Louis, Mo., has finished its work. The three days were very painful for people who attended or watched at home via livestream.

The pain inflicted upon our LGBTQI members, friends and families was intense. But there was also pain in seeing the deep divide among the delegates.

Likewise, many of us feel this doesn't reflect the United Methodist Church's doctrine on grace. The One Church Plan, which was recommended by the Council of Bishops, and which would have given space for clergy, all churches (no matter what their stand on human sexuality), and annual conferences to be in ministry within their contexts was defeated by a very close margin: 438-384, 54 votes.

Instead, the Traditional Plan was approved. It not only affirms what is presently in the Book of Discipline about homosexuality but places far more restrictions and penalties on clergy performing weddings for LGBTQI members. It also tightens the existing restrictions on ordination based on sexual orientation.

The Traditional Plan was referred to the Judicial Council, the denomination's top court, for a declaratory decision on its constitutionality (a number of the items have previously been declared unconstitutional). We will know more about what portions of the legislation will become church law after the Judicial Council meets April 23-26 in Evanston, IL.

Because I supported the overwhelming recommendation of the Council of Bishops for the One Church Plan, I will unabashedly say that I am deeply disappointed that the One Church Plan did not prevail and the Traditional Plan did. The hurt has been tremendous across the global church and certainly within our annual conference, beginning with our delegates and all the observers who attended.

I am deeply disappointed because it is so hurtful to the LGBTQI community, family and friends. I am deeply disappointed because I believe we have just lost another generation who will not want to be a part of a church that seems so judgmental. I am deeply disappointed because I think we will lose members and have difficulty reaching new people (not just LGBTQI people) due to the message this action sends.

To our LGBTQI members, friends, families, and welcoming congregations: 438 votes can't take away God's love for you! You are beloved children of God and of sacred worth. I love you and so many in our churches love you and will continue to care for you.

I know that not everyone is grieved by

the actions of the General Conference. We are more diverse as an annual conference than many realize. I will be the bishop of the whole annual conference, including those of you who are relieved that the Traditional Plan has prevailed.

Northern Illinois Conference has in effect lived in the One Church Plan for some time. The reality is that most of our churches, especially the larger the congregation, are very diverse within the same wide spectrum of traditional and progressive that was found at General Conference.

Somehow, we've learned to be church together and love one another in spite of our differences on human sexuality and many other things. Also, remember that these restrictions do not exclude laity from membership or leadership in the local church or beyond.

What happens next? There are so many unknowns. I would encourage us all to pause and take a breath. We need clarity of mind and spirit. We need to talk with each other about how we live into this new reality as an annual conference.

As I've said all along, the day after the Special Session of General Conference we will continue to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world.

Yes, we will continue to grow in our love for our neighbor and God. We will feed the hungry and provide relief for those who have experienced a natural disaster.

We will visit the sick and care for the dying.

We will work to eliminate gun violence and to care for the immigrant with mercy and justice.

We will love and care for our LGBTQI members, friends and families.

We will be the church!

## Staff-Parish Response

The following is the March 12, 2019 response of the ORUMC Staff-Parish Relations Committee regarding the decision of the Special General Conference 2019 to uphold the ðTraditional Planö as offered by the Way Forward Commission of the UMC.

The ðTraditional Planö affirms the 1972 Book of Discipline language which prohibits LGBTQI persons from ministry in the UMC.

The ðTraditional Planö also affirms the traditional view on marriage and human sexuality.

The ðTraditional Planö and its components is under review by the Judicial Council of the UMC.

*We recognize the pain of LGBTQI individuals, families and friends during this time in the life of the church.*

*The following was presented to Ad Council March 21 by **Jill Wood-Naatz**.*

I am a Methodist because my parents and grand parents were Methodist I continue to be United Methodist by choice because of John Wesley's theology of grace and justification by faith and his belief in doing all the good you can for all the people you can for as long as you can as well as our long history of social justice.

I am a United Methodist in this church for over 40 years because I have found an extended family here. I have found ways to serve here and I have felt love here. Much of my life has been devoted to building and sustaining this family of God.

The UMC is part of my DNA, part of who I am because of you and many many others throughout my life.

That being said, I believe God is love and God loves all of us equally, fully, and compassionately no matter who we are. And I firmly believe that we, the church of Jesus Christ, must take a stand. We must let others know what we believe.

I attended the special session of general conference because I felt called to do so, I wanted to feel God's presence and to feel how we were treating one another.

As you know, the delegates voted to not be inclusive of all people. They voted to say that our LGBTQ brothers and sisters cannot be who God has made them to be and be compatible with Christian teachings. And this in spite of the fact that Jesus, in his teachings

in the Gospels, never mentioned the issue.

I am ashamed and embarrassed for my church at this time. I reject this decision, but I don't want to reject my church.

But to tell our LGBTQ seminarians that they are not worthy of being ordained is absolute cruelty. To tell our LGBTQ friends they cannot be joined together in a marriage blessed by God is unthinkable to me. The church should be the safest place for them to be who they are.

Therefore I am asking this body to take a stand against this vote and in support of the LGBTQ community. And I am speaking for many others in our church who are waiting for our leaders to respond.

Many churches have already done so. To do nothing is to say we agree with this decision.

How might we respond?

1. We can write a letter of support to bishop Sally Dyck.

2. We can put a statement on our web site.

3. We can place a sign in front of our church.

4. We can make a statement in our bulletin each Sunday.

5. We can do all of these things.

There are many ways to approach this, but as I said before, doing nothing is to say we agree.

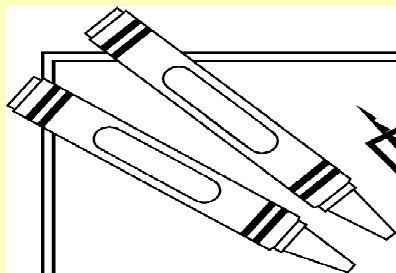
